

We live in an area of the country where nature keeps us cognizant of time as it moves us through the seasons. For some, time is mounted in tradition steeped or treasure accumulated. For others, time is measured in change and transformation --whether intentional, deliberate. natural. or accidental. Time can be slowed down by the wonders of chemistry and science, but it can not be stopped. Youth extols there is all the time in the world. Age mourns the passing of it.

There are countless rewards for those of us who chose education as a life's career. Counted among them is the awareness of time. Watching the continuous awe of children in discovery, witnessing them growing from stage to stage, watching them develop from little children to young adults, certainly reminds us that time moves on as we prepare our students to take their places in society. But on the other hand, these very same experiences let time stand still. Educators enjoy the sweet innocence of early childhood and revel in the joy of seeing students reach their goals and potentials knowing they may just have had a part in that achievement. Time moves us forward in our journey. Loving every minute of it where you are and what you're doing is priceless.

One of the subtle themes that runs through the instructional days at St. James School is the appreciation of the time we have been given and how well we use it. What we do, why we do it, and how we well we use it transcends across Religion lessons, to literary and historical character analysis, to scientific experiments and mathematical problems. The most important instruction of all, however, is learning how to take time, to have time, to spend time with who and on what are truly the most meaningful in our lives.
