PLAYER OF THE YEAR

TAYLOR TOTLAND

There was a buzz surrounding Taylor Totland even before she hit a shot for Red Bank Catholic in 2010 because she had already established herself as a force on the junior golf circuit.

Four seasons later, Totland heads off to Furman, one of college golf's top women's programs, having set a standard for girls' golf that will be almost impossible to top.

For the fourth straight season Totland is the Asbury Park Press Player of the Year. And not only was she her usual self in tournament play, she helped the Caseys to their best season.

"We're going to miss her that's for sure," said RBC coach Bill Kusch, chuckling at the obvious nature of his statement.

"She is very special. I just think her willingness to put in long hours of practice, I can't say enough about not only how she lifted herself but lifted our whole team. That's a reflection on her leadership as a captain. It rubbed off on the other girls. I think the best compliment I can give her is the impact she had on the other players."

Totland began her season by winning her fourth straight Monmouth County Tournament title, as the Caseys rolled to the team title.

After suffering the only loss of her career in area play at last year's Shore Conference Tournament, she rebounded to win the SCT for a third time, with the Caseys once again taking the top spot at Pine Barrens.

Totland placed second at the NJSIAA Tournament of Champions as a sophomore, before winning the overall state championship as a junior at Trump National in Colts Neck.

She capped her high school career at this year's Tournament of Champions with a second place finish. She finished one shot behind Montgomery's Alice Chen, who rolled in a long birdie putt on the 17th green at Cherry Valley.

For the second straight year, the Caseys finished second in the team battle behind Ridge. They cut the deficit to 16 shots this time thanks to a solid team total of 341.

"I know not every kid can get to her level," Kusch said. Bbut the girls see how hard she works. She is a great example. You have to work hard at everything in life if you want to achieve things. That's been the most impressive thing over her four years, and hopefully we can maintain that level when she's gone."

To put Totland's career in perspective, in the 12 major individual events she competed in, she won eight of them, and finished second three other times.
